

Defining Vulnerable Populations



VULNERABILITY IS DEFINED AS..

the degree to which a population or individual is susceptible to harm or neglect influenced by both inherent (e.g., age, sex, race) and acquired (e.g., health behaviors, environment, sociocultural behaviors) risk factors². Risk factors contribute to the vulnerability of an individual or population². Inherent and acquired elements dynamically interact and influence the health outcomes of a person or group².



VULNERABLE POPULATIONS ARE...

groups and communities at a higher risk for poor physical, psychological, or social health¹⁻³. These barriers are further intensified due to social, economic, political, and environmental components. Limitations due to illness or disability can also influence the vulnerability of a population⁵.



THOSE WITH PHYSICAL HEALTH NEEDS¹⁻³

include:

- · mothers and infants
- · the elderly
- chronically ill or groups living with physical disabilities
- populations living with HIV/AIDS



THOSE WITH PSYCHOLOGICAL HEALTH NEEDS 1-3

include:

- groups living with mental illness or disabilities
- substance users
- the suicide or homicide prone



03 THOSE WITH SOCIAL HEALTH

include:

- families experiencing domestic violence
- homeless populations
- immigrants and refugees
- populations with low literacy rates



04 THOSE WITH BARRIERS OR LIMITATIONS 1-3,5

include:

- racial, ethnic, sexual, or gender minorities
- rural residents with limited access to healthcare services
- · economically disadvantaged
- the uninsured
